# Reflections From Our President

Dear Colleagues,

I am proud to present the North Carolina Dental Society Foundation's six-year impact report, which details the organization's significant role in removing economic and physical barriers to dental care faced by North Carolinians. The Foundation has been working towards ensuring that oral health is given the priority it deserves and that equitable access is granted to all without hindrances. The Foundation could not be successful in its endeavors without the strong commitment of the North Carolina dental community. Over the past six years, with your help, the Foundation has provided timely dental treatment at the value of \$38.5 million to more than 72,000 North Carolinians through the Missions of Mercy program.

As a qualified workforce shortage continues to significantly affect dental offices, the Foundation is helping build the pipeline of auxiliary team members. The Foundation is working to strengthen the dental workforce by providing more than \$85,000 in scholarships to more than 60 students in dental assisting and hygiene programs at community colleges.

We are grateful that the State of North Carolina has entrusted the Foundation with \$400,000 to support the NC Missions of Mercy clinics for another two years through June 2025. Previously, we received \$200,000 for the period between June 2021 and May 2023, which allowed us to bring a 45-chair clinic to Elkin this year that served 460 patients and provided more than \$292,000 in dental care. The state grant also allowed us to invest in equipment to establish Mini MOM clinics at NC community colleges. We held our first Mini MOM at Central Piedmont Community College in April, treating 85 patients and providing more than \$57,500 in complimentary dental care.

The Foundation thanks each of you who volunteers in the Missions of Mercy and Give Kids A Smile programs as well as our donors. We are truly your Foundation – our success and programmatic impact would not be possible without you! Together, we will continue to improve oral health for all.



## Strengthening the Dental Teams Pipeline

#### **Scholarships for Dental Hygiene and Assisting Students**

he COVID-19 pandemic caused massive disruptions in the dental workforce across the United States. The effects are still felt three years later as dentists continue to struggle to find dental hygienists and assistants, according to the American Dental Association Health Policy Institute. The Foundation is working alongside dentists in North Carolina to address the adverse impact the pandemic has had on practices since 2020 — initially by organizing webinars on burnout for dentists and eventually by focusing on long-term solutions, like investing in the dental workforce pipeline. Efforts include scholarships for dental assisting and hygiene students and creating awareness among high school students about career paths in the dental auxiliary field.

Through a grant from the Dogwood Health Trust, The Foundation awarded \$1,500 and \$3,000 scholarships to students at Western Piedmont, AB Tech, and Isothermal Community Colleges. A total of 43 scholarships have been distributed since 2021. Further, 20 students and dental assistants interested in taking the Certified Dental Assistant (CDA) exam were offered scholarships of \$450 each to cover the examination fee. The scholarship checks are made directly to the college to be applied to the student's final semester and are awarded in the semester right before as an incentive to encourage course completion. Applicants are screened for financial need and merit and are given the flexibility to use the award to cover childcare needs while attending classes, internships, and other course-related expenses.

Taylor Austin, a Western Piedmont Community College DA scholarship recipient expressed sincere gratitude for her gift, "Thank you so much for the scholarship! I plan to utilize it in many ways! This scholarship will provide

additional scrub attire for clinical rotations, and travel, along with books and supplies for class."

The Foundation has made this a statewide priority and is currently working with Central Piedmont and Cape Fear Community Colleges to award another 24 scholarships before the new year. The scholarships have a profound impact on mitigating hardships faced by students while navigating their programs. LaQueisha Anderson, an AB Tech Community College DA scholarship recipient said, "Receiving the scholarship has helped me worry less about finances while in school and focus on the program a lot more. I wasn't working at the time, so it put stress on me, and I wasn't sure how I would even pay to take my national boards. When I heard about being selected to be chosen to receive this scholarship it lifted a weight off my shoulders. I am so thankful that I was chosen to receive this scholarship and I hope that it will continue because there is always someone in need."

Completing the Certified Dental Assistant (CDA) exam which is a certification provided by the Dental Assisting National Board (DANB) is considered one of the highest credibility for dental assistants. On receiving a scholarship to take the exam, Starlit Ernst said, "I am beyond thankful to have received this scholarship. The DANB is an expensive exam to take, and since the exam is required to become a CDA the financial burden is unavoidable. After learning of my selection for the scholarship, I am relieved knowing the financial hardship is no longer an issue. I hope that this scholarship continues to provide financial assistance to future students."



Deni Cockerham from Isothermal Community College was thrilled to receive the gift to cover her CDA examination fees and expressed, "The scholarship that was given to me by NCDSF to take the DANB was so helpful. I was able to pass the exam and now I am a Certified Dental Assistant, and I could not be prouder!"

## **North Carolina Missions of Mercy**

## **Embracing the spirit of Volunteerism and Community Service for Accessible Dental care**

he North Carolina Dental Society worked toward providing dental care to the uninsured and underserved communities long before the establishment of the NC Dental Society Foundation. Since 2009, and under the aegis of the NC Dental Health Fund, the Dental Society leveraged the support of its generous and driven member dentists to successfully host North Carolina Missions of Mercy (NC MOM) clinics across the state. To date, NC MOM has provided \$38.7 million in free dental care to more than 72,000 patients.

The NC MOM program is now the Foundation's flagship initiative and its free dental clinics continue to serve adults who face economic or geographic barriers to receiving dental care, many of whom suffer from acute pain or are in immediate need of dental care. A typical 45-chair clinic is held over two days and serves approximately **600 patients.** The clinics are held in local host communities around the state, utilizing portable dental equipment and instruments. Dentists, dental hygienists, dental assistants, lab techs, medical health professionals, and community members all volunteer their time to staff the clinics. In addition to receiving treatment, patients receive education on proper oral hygiene, as well as supplies to take home. This model of access to care through volunteerism is the hallmark of the Foundation's MOM clinic outreach program. The clinics are a

turning point, not just for the patients but also for the volunteers who come together in the spirit of service and community advancement.

The program has evolved, and the Foundation is piloting Mini MOM clinics where patients are seen at community colleges with dental assisting clinic facilities. The Foundation purchased the dental equipment for these one-day Mini MOMs and also helps the host location in raising funds to invest in the supplies required for each clinic. This model helps the respective college in strengthening its curriculum while enabling an increased opportunity for charitable dental care. The first Mini MOM clinic was held at the Central Piedmont Community College in April 2023. Eighty-five patients were treated in just nine hours, amounting to more than \$57,500 in complimentary dental care. More than 150 volunteers helped with this effort.

Two 45-chair clinics were also organized that same year. An Elkin clinic served 460 patients and brought together 400 volunteers to provide dental care totaling more than \$292,000 in value. Wilmington's MOM clinic served more than 872 patients with the help of nearly 600 volunteers, totaling care of more than \$585,984.

## **Starting Young**

#### **Promoting Dental Care Among School Children**

n North Carolina, almost 50 percent of schoolchildren have tooth decay, according to the NC Department of Health and Human Services, Oral Health Section. Further, disparities in oral health status between socioeconomic groups are also widespread. According to an analysis by NC Child, "children from poor, rural counties in North Carolina tend to have the highest rates of decay."



NCDSF has been working to address these disparities and make oral health care available to all children by actively promoting and coordinating the ADA's Give Kids a Smile initiative as well as incentivizing dentists to launch school-based programs in Title 1 schools across the State. Since 2017, NC Dental Society members have provided 75,341 children with oral health support through screenings, treatments, toothbrush distribution drives, and oral health education. More than \$3.9 million worth of dental treatment has been provided to low-income and underinsured kids in the state.

The goal of the school-based program is to provide all children with access to a dental home irrespective of their economic status and geographic location, thus establishing healthy dental care at a young age. A school-based dental program is not intended to replace the dental home model; rather it is a complement and vital point of access for preventive care and referrals, as needed. To help dentists, establish on-site pediatric dental services at Title 1 middle schools, the North Carolina Dental Society Foundation will provide four selected dentists with \$5,000 to support the process. The ideal dentist/ dental office, and will be open to getting in front of school boards, working with the local health department, identifying patients, and delivering care in their respective communities. The feedback from this pilot will drive best practices to improve oral health across the state.

## Here below are the eligibility criteria for dentists/dental offices interested in this program:

- Must have a practice or work at a clinic within North Carolina
- Willing to identify and work with Title 1 schools in North Carolina
- Willing to provide services without any out-of-pocket charge to the patients and open to billing Medicaid/Health Choice or the patient's commercial insurance when appropriate.

#### **Endowment Grants and Public Health Award**

Since 2018, The Foundation has awarded more than \$100,000 to organizations working to increase access to dental care.

here are three counties In North Carolina without any practicing dentists. Nearly 13% of kindergarten-aged children have untreated tooth decay, and 21% of adults 65+ have lost all their natural teeth. Given the dire need for access to dental care in our state, the Foundation realizes it can only meet this need, especially in rural communities, by strengthening the efforts of previously established peer organizations that are caring for underserved populations.

The Foundation's annual Dental Public Health Award recognizes one deserving organization each year with \$1,500, typically the North Carolina Public Health Association's fall conference. Additionally, the Foundation



gives \$5,000 in grants through its endowment fund each year. To date, five organizations have been recognized for exceptional endeavors through awards, and 19 have received endowment grants.

The Veterans Smile Clinic, an organization that provides education and financial services to veterans in North Carolina, received the 2023 Dental Public Health Award. The following entities were awarded grants:

- Moore Free and Charitable Clinic is the sole outpatient safety-net health provider for Moore County and as part of its
  holistic efforts to reduce health disparities in outcomes and access, MFCC provides dental services to its patients. The
  organization will use the Foundation's endowment grant to integrate oral health into its current medical services. Priority
  will be given to its current patients, particularly those in treatment for type 2 diabetes. MFCC will create a cohort of
  approximately 150 patients receiving routine diabetes care who also have periodontal disease.
- NC Caring Dental Professionals assists members of the dental profession and their families who suffer from alcohol or drug addiction, stress, professional burnout, or other impairments.
- UNC's Serving through Mobile dentistry to Inspire, Lift, and Empower (SMILE) clinic is the first mobile dentistry
  clinic at the UNC Adams School of Dentistry and brings dental care to those who are unable to seek care at a dental
  clinic. At each clinic, 10 dental students volunteer to serve as operators and assistants and are supervised by a faculty
  member.

Mountain Community Health Partnership (MCHP) is a Federally
Qualified Health Center serving low-income, uninsured, and
underinsured residents of Mitchell and Yancey Counties in rural western
North Carolina. Through the endowment grant, MCHP aims to expand
a program that provides financial assistance to low-income, uninsured
patients with extensive dental treatment plans.

We are proud of how our previous grant and award recipients have used both recognition and funds to strengthen their work in making dental care accessible to all.

East Carolina University's School of Dental Medicine's Sonrie clinic, a 2022 endowment grant recipient, serves the Hispanic/Latinx populations in and around Pitt County. The endowment grant was used to host a clinic in March 2023 whereby twenty-four patients received treatment through almost 185 procedures including fillings, cleanings, extractions, a root canal, and other services, totaling nearly \$8,600 in care.

**FirstHealth Dental Care**, a Dental Public Health Award winner, has provided care to more than 30,000 underserved children (0-21) who receive Medicaid, Health Choice, or are uninsured and qualify by income level in Moore and Montgomery counties. Dr. Sharon Harrell, Director of FirstHealth Dental Care said, "We have been providing dental care to underserved children for nearly 25 years, and this award is a testament to the commitment from our entire team. They all work so hard to care for our patients, and I'm proud of their efforts."









